Public Invited to 28th Annual Open House - Sept 28th

Join us for the 28th Annual East Pierce Fire & Rescue Open House from 1 to 4 p.m. Saturday, September 28th, at the East Pierce headquarters station at 18421 Veterans Memorial Drive East, in Bonney Lake.

The free health and safety fair will include more than two dozen interactive booths and displays, such as the fire department's special operations teams - Technical Rescue, Wildland, HazMat, and Water Rescue. Live demonstrations featuring the Jaws of Life will occur throughout the event.

Get an up-close look at EPFR's Ladder 113, Marine 122, and the popular Airlift Northwest medical helicopter scheduled to land around 1:30 p.m.

The highlight every year for most kids is the chance to play firefighter. Younger children suit up in pint-size firefighter gear to put out a fire and perform a rescue. Older children can participate in a more challenging course.

In addition to conveying important

safety messages, East Pierce fire-fighters will be selling discounted life jackets (\$17), bike helmets (\$8), and multi-sport helmets (\$11). The wearer must be present for a custom fitting. Children and adult sizes will be available on a first-come, first-served basis. The Bonney Lake Rite Aid will offer flu shots (insurance billing only).

Top it off with free ice cream, popcorn, and cotton candy from the East Pierce Professional Firefighters Local 3520.

Dick's Drive In will be on site selling their tasty burgers, potato chips, and milkshakes.

HEALTH Flu Season is Coming! Are You Protected?

Each year, East Pierce Fire & Rescue firefighter-paramedics transport seriously ill flu patients to local hospitals. Getting vaccinated against the flu is a crucial step in protecting yourself, your family, and your friends.

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), flu seasons are unpredictable and vary in severity. During the last decade, the CDC estimates that between 12,000 and 52,000 people have died each year in the United States from flu-related complications. Additionally, hundreds of thousands of Americans are hospitalized each year during a severe season. As a result, the CDC recommends that everyone over six months of age should get vaccinated.

The flu (influenza) is a contagious respiratory disease. Common signs and symptoms include:

- Fever
- Cough
- Sore throat
- Muscle or body aches
- Headaches
- Fatigue

In most healthy people, the flu will disappear in five to seven days. However, in some cases, the flu can result in a life-threatening illness.

Who has the greatest risk for serious illness? Children under the age of five, pregnant women, seniors, and people

with chronic diseases, such as heart disease, asthma, and emphysema. A flu infection can lead to pneumonia, sepsis, or death in these patients.

Flu activity is unpredictable. The timing, severity, and length of flu activity can change from one year to the next. Flu vaccination is key to preventing illness.

Getting the flu vaccine continues to remain the cornerstone of preventing influenza. Every year, scientists try to match the vaccine against the most probable strains of the influenza virus that are expected to appear and circulate during the flu season. The vaccines are inexpensive and covered by health insurance plans, usually with no co-pays.

Are there health risks from getting a flu vaccine? In short, no. Unfortunately, years ago, falsified research data was spread linking vaccines to increased rates of autism in children. Reputable research organizations, hospitals, and pediatricians have demonstrated that there is no link between autism and flu vaccines.

Most experts recommend getting a flu vaccine in September or October. Even if you don't have a family doctor, most pharmacies can give the flu vaccine. The health department also distributes free flu vaccine for children to medical providers throughout Pierce County.

If you're over 65, talk to your provider or pharmacist about whether you should get the "high-dose" vaccine, which is designed to elicit better immune responses in older persons.

"Vaccinated patients may sometimes still get the flu—but will often have less serious symptoms," says East Pierce Assistant Chief Jeff Moore. "Remember that it takes two full weeks after getting the vaccine for antibodies to develop in the body to provide maximum protection."

Let's fight the flu! Keep up healthy habits of washing hands often, covering coughs and sneezes with tissue or your elbow, and staying home when

When to Call 911 for the Flu

Contact your physician or 911 if the following symptoms are present:

- Difficulty breathing or feeling short of breath.
- Severe headache or stiff neck.
- · Sudden dizziness, confusion, or trouble staying awake.
- Children who are difficult to arouse, not interacting, or who are irritable when being held.
- · Dehydration (parched mouth or no urination in 8+ hours).
- Babies younger than three months old with a high fever or fever lasting more than five days.

SMOKE ALARMS

A Sound You Can Live With

Studies reveal that three out of five home fire deaths in the U.S. resulted from fires in structures without working smoke alarms. Homes with working smoke alarms reduced the risk of fire fatalities by an astounding 50%.

Thanks to a partnership with the American Red Cross, who provides smoke alarms to East Pierce Fire & Rescue, firefighters can install smoke alarms in homes within the district at no charge. The program is geared toward at-risk residents, including older adults, low-income, people with disabilities, and those who reside in mobile homes. The smoke alarms are equipped with long-life batteries which last approximately ten years.

"In the event of a fire, properly installed and maintained smoke alarms can save your life," says East Pierce Fire Marshal Bill Sandlian. "Smoke alarms provide early detection of a fire to allow your family time to escape safelv."

Alarms should be installed inside and outside all sleeping areas and on every level of the home, including the basement. Since smoke and poisonous gases rise, installing smoke alarms on the ceiling is ideal and provides the earliest detection.

"A working smoke alarm continuously scans the air for smoke, 24-hours a day, seven days a week. It never sleeps," says Sandlian.

Hearing impaired alarms are also available, equipped with a lower-frequency tone and bed shaker component.

Know your alarm, know your battery!

Smoke alarms that are hard wired into your home typically have a battery backup, which is usually an alkaline battery. Stand alone smoke alarms can either use an alkaline or longlife (lithium) battery.

Alkaline batteries should be replaced once a year.

Long-life batteries should be installed when the smoke alarm goes in, and the entire unit (including the battery) can be replaced in about 10 years.

CALL IF YOU CAN TEXT IF YOU CAN'T

id you know you can text 911? If you cannot safely call 911, you can text for emergency police, fire, or medical aid in Pierce County. South Sound 911's text-to-911 service provides the community (including the Deaf, hard of hearing, or speech disabled) a potentially life-saving option to reach 911. It is also available for those in a situation where calling 911 might endanger a life or escalate the situation.

Text-to-911 is not a method of convenience - the service is for emergencies only. While voice calls to 911 are still the most effective way to get emergency help, textto-911 is available when you cannot safely make a voice call. Simply stated, call if you can, text if you can't.

Type a message with the location of the emergency (including the city) and the nature of the emergency (what is happening and whether you need police, fire, or medical aid).

How to send a text to 911

- Open your mobile phone's text messaging program.
- Enter the numbers 911 in the "To" field.
- Type a message with the location of the emergency (including the city) and the nature of the emergency (what is happening and whether you need police, fire, or medical aid).
- Press the "Send" button or arrow.

Things to remember:

- · Your first message should include the nature of the emergency and the exact location, including the city. (When you text or call on a cellular phone, 911 may not know your precise location.)
- Keep messages brief.
- Do not send photos or videos or use group texts, abbreviations, or emojis.
- Currently, text-to-911 service is only available in English.
- A text sent to 911 in an area without text-to-911 service should receive an automatic reply stating the service is not available.
- There may be instances when a voice call cannot connect due to poor cellular signal or other phone service interruption,

but a text message can still go through.

In our region, in addition to Pierce County, text-to-911 is also available in neighboring King, Kitsap, Snohomish, and Thurston Counties.

BOND UPDATE: Station 111 Nearing Completion

In November 2018, voters approved La bond to replace all six front-line fire engines and a ladder truck, replace four fire stations, and build a new fire station in Tehaleh. Many projects slowed due to COVID impacts but are once again moving along.

Below is a brief status update of these projects.

Fire Station Construction Status

- ► Station 118 Edgewood Construction complete. Opened in fall 2023.
- ► Station 111 Bonney Lake Under construction. Opens in fall
- ► Station 114 Lake Tapps Under construction. Opens in fall 2024.
- ► Station 117 Tehaleh Under construction. Opens in early 2025.
- ► Station 112 Prairie Ridge In permitting. Construction begins in fall 2024.

► Ladder 113 and Engines 111, 112, 114, 116, 118, and 124 are received and serving our communities.

Outdoor Burning Permits Available Online

Residential fire permits are available on-line beginning October 1st in designated areas of the fire district, providing no fire safety or air quality burn bans are in effect.

Visit www.eastpiercefire.org for details to obtain a burn permit and view regulations and burn area boundaries.

OR take a greener route! Rather than burning, consider chipping, composting, mulching, or hauling excess yard debris to a local recycle/transfer station.

Who Is East Pierce FIRE & RESCUE?

East Pierce Fire & Rescue was founded on a strong commitment to customer service. The district's Mission, Vision, and Values guide the department and its employees' actions. Exceptional customer service and concern for employees and their families have become hallmarks of our culture.

EPFR was formed when the City of Bonney Lake Fire Department, Pierce County Fire District 22/Lake Tapps Fire, and Pierce County Fire District 24 merged in 2000 to provide a seamless response to emergencies.

Since then, the following mergers or annexations into EPFR have occurred:

- 2006: Pierce County Fire District 12 and South Prairie/Fire District 20
- 2008: Sumner/Fire District 1
- 2010: Edgewood/Fire District 8
- 2013: Milton Fire Department

Today, East Pierce serves approximately 100,500 residents living in and around Bonney Lake, Sumner, Lake Tapps, the Ridge Communities, South Prairie, Tehaleh, Edgewood, and Milton. The district covers approximately 153 square miles and protects residents from eight stations - seven staffed and one facility on Lake Tapps for the marine rescue unit.

All full-time firefighters are cross-trained as either emergency medical technicians (EMTs) or paramedics and can respond to medical emergencies and fires.

An independently-elected Board of Commissioners governs the agency.
